If they don't learn play limits while they are young, they often develop inappropriate playful aggression. Meaning, it may be cute when a kitten attacks your ankles when you walk by or playfully nips at your fingers while you're playing but won't be cute, not to mention annoying and painful, when they are full grown.

Let's also not forget that kittens playing together is one of the most adorable and entertaining activities you will ever see!
